

In Memoriam: Charlotte Drury

March 26, 1920 - April 15, 2020

UUCW members were saddened to hear of the passing of Charlotte (Patria) Drury on April 15 at Alliance Health at Baldwinville, where she had been a resident for the past several years.

Charlotte was a life-long Winchendon resident, and a lovely community member and friend to many past and present church members. She joined UUCW in 1955 along with her brother and sister-in-law, Maurice and Eunice Patria. Her husband Richard Drury joined in 1963. May would have marked her 65th anniversary as a UUCW church member! She sang in our choir and served on the Standing Committee.



We last visited Charlotte at Christmastime, when we shared cookies and reminisced about her time at the church. She was pleased to hear of our Set in Stone stonework repair campaign. We were planning to return to celebrate Charlotte's 100th birthday on March 26,

but the stay-at-home restrictions placed our visit on hold. Unfortunately, we were unable to have that celebration, although Charlotte did pass that most significant milestone.

While only a small part of the solution, UUCW is resuming ONK with a "drivethrough" take-out model. Our test supper will be held from 5:30 - 6:30 PM on Thursday, May 14, when we reprise one of our more popular meals from the winter: baked ziti with sweet Italian sausage. Diners may take advantage of our front circle, and drive around to a waiting table of "to-go" containers, in the comfort and confinement of their cars. Should this experiment go well, we plan to repeat the drive-through model at our next scheduled ONK date of May 28. We'll put out our ONK banners on the lawn and post on our website and Facebook page to confirm we're a "go."



It most certainly isn't the same as sitting at our long banquet tables and visiting with each other, but it does get some nutritious hot meals in the hands of those who really need them, and even for those who are weary of cooking at home. See you on May 14!
