### Notice of Annual Meeting

All legal members of UUCW are notified to meet in the Parish Hall on Sunday, June 28, at 5:00 PM for our Annual Meeting. The seven Articles to be voted on are:

ARTICLE I – To choose a moderator for the governing of the meeting.

ARTICLE II – To receive reports of the Governing Board, the Treasurer, and any other Officers and Committees required to report to the church or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE III – To see if the church will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Governing Board, to borrow money during the ensuing year, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE IV – To appropriate money for the support of preaching and do the necessary parish charges for the current year, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE V – To elect a Clerk, a Treasurer, a Financial Secretary, an Auditor, members of the Governing Board, and other such officers, committees, and delegates as the Meeting may deem proper for the ensuing year or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE VI – To see if the church wishes to engage a minister in any capacity for the next church year, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE VII – To transact any other business that may properly come before the meeting.

Members of the public are welcome to attend and observe the proceedings, but are not eligible to vote.

Based upon Massachusetts Phase 1 reopening guidelines for houses of worship, we anticipate being able to hold this meeting indoors while maintaining adequate social distancing and attendance numbers. Attendees are expected to wear masks should they still be in force by that time.

This is an important year for UUCW, both directionally and financially, and we look forward to your input at the Annual Meeting.

### The Boiler Bows Out

A building of this age and size will always present new challenges. No one knows how old our boiler really is...but records take it back at least 30 years. As my mother would acknowledge: "It doesn't owe us anything."



Our days of patching, coaxing and handwringing are over. The boiler finally heaved its last gasp this past winter. It (barely) made it through the heating season and we have shut it down for good. We are facing an unplanned \$16,000 cost for its replacement. That expense is layered on top of our usual operating expenses, and is the focus of our annual fundraising drive currently underway (see following article). We have until October to restore heat to the building!

## UUCW's Annual Fundraising Drive

Every spring UUCW embarks on our annual fundraising drive. This is when we reach out to all of our members and other associates of the church to seek financial support for our fiscal year beginning July 1.

We have ambitious goals and invoices to accompany them. Our Set in Stone capital campaign launched only one year ago, and will continue for several more years, as we tackle stonework repairs for each section of the building. Next up is the clock tower, which is in the worst state of disrepair.

Our operational expenses are everpresent. Our large building consumes almost 2000 gallons of fuel oil despite our frugal heating practices. Our Neighbor's Kitchen regularly taxes our propane, electricity and water supplies. As if that weren't enough, our boiler had to call it quits!

Our Treasurer (yours truly) has huddled over the books, putting Scrooge to shame with penny-pinching tactics. We've renegotiated insurance and phone rates, and applied for a variety of different grants. We are forever grateful to our volunteers who have saved our church extraordinary labor costs by donating so much of their time, skills and related supplies.
