## **Challenge of Easter**

## Set in Stone Gears Up for Phase 4

Launched in 2019, our Set in Stone capital campaign to restore our beautiful granite building continues apace. The schedule of grant writing and execution of repair work alternates on a yearly basis. In 2023, we executed Phase 3 repairs, including a complete rebuild of the "valley" between our tower and main building, and grout repairs on sections of the tower. 2024 is a grant-writing year. Our proposed Phase 4 work will address most the next urgent area of deterioration: the West tower wall.



Tucked around the back, away from Central Street, and facing Pleasant Street, the West tower wall is not readily noticed. But a close look at it (see next picture) reveals major areas of missing mortar, cracks, and shifting of stones. The clover-shaped trefoil window also has open areas around it. We've had the window patched from the inside – a temporary and partial fix. All of this leads to water ingress: the biggest enemy of any building.



Once again, we are applying to the Massachusetts Historical Commission (MHC) for a Massachusetts Preservation Projects Fund grant. This is a matching grant program, and we are eternally grateful to the Robinson-Broadhurst Foundation for having promised us the necessary matching funds.

The grant application is rigorous, requiring engineering reports, repair plans, budgets and detailed photographs. The application also asked for letters of community support. We were most grateful to obtain letters from the Winchendon Cultural History and Town of Winchendon Center, the Building Commissioner, the Community Action Committee, Toy Town AA, the Winchendon Courier, Our Neighbor's Kitchen diners, and the Winchendon Historic Commission. We thank all of these folks for their kind words.

We'll hear back from MHC in June, and all fingers are crossed until then. We sincerely hope you will see the nowfamiliar scaffolding gracing our building this time next year.
